STATE OF TEXAS:

Special Road Use Bond Court Order that governs the granting of this permit. This permit is granted, subject to the condition that the applicant, owner, operator or mover of a heavy vehicle, load, object or structure, shall:

- a. Indemnify and save harmless Navarro county from any action, claim, damage or loss whatsoever, arising from and in relation to the protection of persons and property, from injury or damage that may be caused by reason of the driving, operating or moving of any such heavy vehicle, load, object or structure.
- b. Applicant shall not impede or obstruct the flow of traffic on county roadways.
- c. Applicant shall post a road bond in the amount of \$100,000.00 per mile.

Navarro County Health Crisis & Urgent Funding Need

Navarro County is in a medical crisis. We are federally designated as a Medically Underserved Area with a health score of 34/100.

Health Outcomes

- Deaths of despair (suicide, drugs, alcohol): 53,4%
- · Adult obesity: 42% | Childhood obesity: 22%
- Diabetes prevalence: 42.4%
- · Mortality from flu, COVID, pneumonia: above state & national averages

Financial Reality

- Cost per patient visit (Kent Rogers Clinic): \$231 (this number is over head only, not medical treatment))
- · Medicaid reimbursement average of \$68.00
- Funding gap per visit: \$163.00
- In past years: County offset hospital losses with \$500,000 annually. Today, without support, the clinic cannot survive. We are a non-profit, we do not have funds to off set

What's at Stake

Without county support, Navarro County residents will lose primary care, dental, vision, mental health, and other essential services. This is not about extras or over funding-it is about keeping doors open so patients are not turned away because they cannot pay.

2025 Projected Revenue

- Sliding fee scale: 1,654 patients @ \$7.50 = \$12,405.
- Indigent care (Medicaid): 301 visits @ \$68. = \$20,468.
- Medicare: 918 patients @ \$86= \$78,948.00
- Private insurance: 517 patients @ \$120 = \$62,040
- Self-pay: 343 patients @ \$65 = \$\$22,295

Total revenue: \$196,156

2025 Costs

• 4.810 patient visits x \$231 = \$1.111.110

Annual deficit: \$914,954(not including dental, vision, mental health or medical treatments such as radiology, labs; medicines)

County's Commitment

Navarro County is a **co-applicant** with Navarro County Ambulatory Care Association under the **FQHC contract**. By signing this agreement, the county committed to ensure **affordable**, **comprehensive healthcare** for all residents, including working families below poverty guidelines who pay only \$5–\$25 per visit for exams, labs, radiology, and treatment.

What Signing the HRSA/FQHC Contract Means

- 1) We agreed to follow all federal requirements.
- 2) We certify that the health center will comply with HRSA rules.

Failure to comply can result in:

- Loss of FQHC designation and funding
- Repayment of funds and penalties
- Damage to reputation and community trust
- Loss of quality affordable healthcare over 4200 patients and 14 employees will lose their job and benefits.

This funding is not a luxury or over-funding. It is a **lifeline**. Without it, healthcare access collapses for thousands of Navarro County residents.
