### What is 4-H?

#### Scholarship

Each year, the Texas 4-H Youth Development Program awards an estimated \$2.4 million in scholarships to high school seniors. In 2024, **25 youth from the Central District 8 earned \$318,000** in scholarship money for advanced education.

The youth from Bell, Bosque, Coryell, Ellis, Hamilton, Johnson, Leon, McLennan, Milam, **Navarro**, and Williamson Counties are seeking advanced degrees in fields such as Interdisciplinary Studies, Business, Marketing, Food Science, Agribusiness, Agricultural Leadership & Development, Poultry Science, Mechanical Engineering, Education, Food Science, Agricultural Economics, Agricultural Education, Business Management, Welding, Animal Science, Environmental Science, Kinesiology, Finance, Psychology, Physics, Biomedical Sciences, Electrical Engineering, Equine Science, Public Health, Agricultural Communication, and Nursing. Upon completion of their advanced degrees, many of the youth have indicated they would like to return to give back to the communities that helped make their futures possible.

The Texas 4-H scholarship program began in 1959. At that time, the Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo awarded youth with scholarships in the amount of \$1,000. Today the largest scholarships are **\$20,000** presented by the San Antonio Livestock Exposition & the Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo. In 2025, the Texas 4-H Foundation will present the first **\$30,000** scholarship to the overall top scholar.

In 2024, the scholarship program will celebrate 67 years of providing college scholarships to Texas 4-H members and continues to be the largest 4-H scholarship program in the United States.

#### 4-H Project Work and Contests

4-H projects are the educational experiences in which youth who are 4-H members participate. A project is defined as consisting of 5-6 new learning experiences, leadership, community service, and exhibition of their project work. Youth engage in learning experiences through a variety of methods such as project meetings, workshops, tours, interviews, research, and more. All youth are encouraged to teach others about what they have learned to gain leadership skills and are also encouraged to help give back to their community. In addition, youth can engage in competitive events such as presentations, speeches, demonstrations, and/or record books. Adult volunteer leaders will help youth in setting and reaching their goals through their project work.



#### District 8 4-H SURGE (Leadership Lab)

The 4-H Youth Development Program prides itself on teaching leadership life skills to its youth members to grow into successful, contributing members of society in adulthood. One even that teaches and helps youth develop the life skills of our 4-H members is District 8 4-H SURGE (formerly known as Leadership Lab). It is a three-day, two-night program targeted at 4-H members in grade 8-12. District 8 boasts of having the largest participation in the state for the last several years.

Each year, we put a significant emphasis on learning life-skills through hands-on activities. At this year's camp, youth were challenged to push out of their comfort zone through numerous team building & communication skill building exercises. Students were presented with real-world application workshops to enhance their budgeting, interview, meal and personal etiquette and interpersonal skills. This year's camp was held in New Braunfels and afforded participants an "out-of-the-box" camp environment. Students were treated to a day at Schlitterbahn Water Park, where the interpersonal skills, manner education, and mental health awareness were prime educational targets.



The 2024 SURGE held a theme of "Living the 4-H Dream," where participants dreamt of their ideal 4-H project, future career, and life they wanted to live. **There were 114 students from 19 counties, with 25 County Extension Agents** chaperoning and facilitating this educational experience. This event continues to be the highlight of the 4-H year for many of our District 8 students.

## **4-H and Youth Development:**

Navarro County 4-H had 10 clubs during the **2024-2025** enrollment year with **247** youth members enrolled in community clubs and **349 direct and indirect** youth/adult volunteers and adult leaders. A total of **3,081** Navarro County youth have been reached thus far through face-to-face 4-H and curriculum enrichment programming. 4-H youth participated collectively through 4-H membership and various Agricultural literacy and educational programming efforts, including **2 Texas 4-H Shooting Sports Ambassadors**, **1 Texas 4-H Fashion and Interior Design Ambassador**, **5 Texas 4-H Healthy Youth Ambassadors** and **1 Texas 4-H Livestock Ambassadors**.

- **Hatching in the Classroom:** Curriculum enrichment program brings biological and life sciences into the classroom providing hands-on experience of incubating and hatching chicks over a 3-week period. Allows students to learn the basics of life cycles, animal care, and responsibility. **612** youth in grades Pre-K-3<sup>rd</sup> and **53** adult volunteers participated in the program during the **2024-2025** school year that included **5 school districts** across Navarro County.
- **Water Education:** This curriculum enrichment program provides instruction and hands on opportunities to learn about water conservation, erosion, runoff, the effects of pollution, the water cycle and much more, while also providing teachers with TEKS aligned classroom resources to reinforce key points of information that students are required to know for the Science STAAR assessment. **123** 5<sup>th</sup> grade students, **21** teachers/paraprofessionals, participated in 3 hands-on/visual education days, also including another outside educational program.
- **Food and Fiber Round-Up:** In cooperation with the Navarro County Farm Bureau, Southwest Mobile Dairy, PR Equipment, and 4<sup>th</sup> grade students from across Navarro County learn about different agricultural products, services, and commodities. The program involved **599** students and **100** adult and youth volunteers.
- **Other:** **104** youth and **24** adult volunteers participated in summer workshops, fun days, and activities including sewing and Art, Science, Spa, Clover Camp, Crawfish Tour and Fossil Rim Field Trip. Career Days **893** youth. Backpacks of Love **275** youth. Gardening **136** youth.
